The Earthly Occupation of Christ



"Is not this the Carpenter?" Mark 6:3
"Is not this the carpenter's son?" Matthew 13:55

"Of 18 years of Christ's life we know absolutely nothing except what is contained in the words, 'The carpenter'" (Mark 6:3).
What a title for the Lord of Glory!

Oswald Sanders highlights 3 facts from our Lord's choice and pursuit of His work:

I. He Exemplified the Nobility of Labor

- A. Working with His Hands
 - 1. The Son of God thought nothing of working in the carpenter's shop sawing, using a plane, or using a hammer.
 - 2. He worked with His hands, He was a carpenter, a working man who earned His living with His hands.
 - 3. Manual labor, working long and tedious hours.
- B. If it was not beneath the Son of God to work with His hand, then surely it is not beneath any of His children.
 - 1. "Jesus sanctified work, hard work, manual work, grunt work, mundane work, routine work done to the glory of God."
 - 2. "He has imparted to a life of toil both dignity and nobility."

- 3. Genesis 2:15, Adam was assigned by God in the garden of Eden to work and keep it.
- 4. Work predates the Fall; it is beautiful thing done for the glory of God.

II. He Exhibited Perfect Workmanship

- A. "He doeth ALL things well"
 - 1. Our Lord's work as well as His standards were nothing less than perfect.
 - 2. In all things, it can be said of Him, "He doeth all things well."
- B. Our LORD always worked.
 - 1. Before the carpenter shop→ Proverbs 8:29-30→in creation.
 - 2. Always working with the Father > John 5:17
 - 3. In the 'silent years' from 12-30, He worked in the carpenter's shop
- C. "When He was among men, He made ploughs, and yokes and other farm implements." Justin Martyr, who lived shortly after the death of John the apostle.
 - 1. In His ministry, Jesus employed the yoke and the plough to illustrate His sermons.

III. He Extracted Physical Strength for Future Service

- A. Present Labor Produces Future Resource
 - Our Lord's 3 years of public ministry was one of unremitting strain physically, emotionally, and spiritually, which climaxed in the cross
 - 2. Only a physically perfect constitution could have supported ongoing activity and emotional force.
 - 3. On one occasion, Mark 5:30, "He perceived that virtue had gone out of Him," we are given an indication of the cost at which all His ministry was carried out.
 - 4. The physical effort alone was remarkable:
 - a. His recorded journeys during the 3 years→and there is no reason to believe that all His journeys are included→covered at least 2,500 miles travelled on foot.
 - b. He was usually thronged with people, and always teaching, preaching, and healing.
- B. Twelve hours a day spent in the sawpit in the Carpenter's shop in the seclusion of Nazareth—) was but a preparation for the demands of His public ministry.
 - 1. The silent years He recognized as part of His Father's preparation.
 - 2. "They were invaluable in building up the physical and emotional reserves, which He would in the coming years, heavily overdraw and stagger under the weight of His own cross."
 - 3. These considerations bring our Lord very near to us.
 - 4. Although we may not be able to emulate Him in His gracious ministry, it is open to us to follow Him in a life of faithful though hidden work.
