

Sermon Discussion Guide

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP Hebrews 10:19-25 Mark Dever, 11/14/22

Big Idea: The corporate gathering of the church is essential to the Christian life.

- 1. The audience of the Letter to the Hebrews was tempted to leave Christianity to go back to Judaism. What temptations have you seen draw people away from the faith?¹ What are some biblical truths that we can use to combat these?
- 2. Mark said, "When we pray it's like we are living out our adoption in Christ." How does adoption help us understand prayer?
- 3. The Church is defined primarily by *future* hope, rather than *past* failings. What problems arise when we get these mixed up?
- 4. The Christian life is kind of like "the stage of engagement between now and the wedding." How does this give you hope in this season of life?
- 5. Read verses 24-25. The phrase "stir up" is meant to get our attention. Rather than provoking one another to evil, we are to provoke one another to "love and good works." Is there a Christian you know who makes you want to love the Lord more? How has the Lord used them in your life?
- 6. Mark said, "A virtual church is about as useful as a virtual spouse, or a virtual body, or a virtual resurrection." Live-streaming can be a blessing for those who are providentially hindered from coming to church on Sundays. What would you say to the type of person who *prefers* live-stream than gathering with the body? What might the author of Hebrews say to this person?²
- 7. Mark said, "To miss this [church gathering] should normally hurt, just like things being out of place in our body ordinarily cause us pain." If a non-Christian asked you the difference between Church and any other gathering, what would you say? What are they missing out on?
