

"The Great Prostitute and the Beast" Sunday Morning, April 7th, 2024

Big Idea: God's plan for the salvation of his people includes evil waging war against evil.

- 1. Like many passages in Revelation, there is a lot of stark imagery. What imagery jumps out at you from this passage?
- 2. Why is Babylon depicted as a prostitute?
- 3. "Babylon is a symbol of the world, the system; the way things operate in a fallen humanity. Babylon represents the temptation to go along *with* the world, to share in the world's wealth." How are we tempted to go along with the world to share in its wealth?
- 4. The letters to the 7 Churches at the beginning of Revelation ended with "to him who overcomes." How does this color the way we understand chapter 17?
- 5. Read Rev 21:1-3; 9-11. How do these verses compare with ch 17? What does this show us?
- 6. Meditate for a moment on verse 14. How does this verse stand out in the chapter?
- 7. See verses 6-7. Even John marvels at the great prostitute. How does the Bible describe the greatness of the Kingdom of God in contrast to the kingdom of the world?
- 8. "Evil is not as united as it seems." Where do we see this in our culture? Can you think of anywhere in Scripture where evil turns on evil?
- 9. How is it that God's people conquer with the Lamb? "They <u>follow</u> him and are <u>forgiven</u> by him." How is this good news for us?

Questions for Kids:

- What do you remember about the sermon Sunday morning?
- Should we still obey Jesus even when everyone around us doesn't?
- How can we obey Jesus today?
